CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2025

The chairman presents his statement for the year.

Dear Member,

I often stop to think as I write my annual report to Members on behalf of the Committee – "What have we actually achieved in the last year?"

It is so easy just to do what we have always done and think it is enough, but the world continues to change around us and, as the old saying goes, "if you stand still, you go backwards". Have we done what the membership would want us to? Have we achieved all that we reasonably can in order to promote the objects of the Society? I hope, when you have read this, that you will feel that your Society has been active, doing and achieving the right things. I hope you will also be pleased to see just how much is going on. However, if you think we have not, do please get in touch or, even better, volunteer to help.

During the year since I last wrote to you, the Society has (amongst other things and in no particular order):

- Organised
 - the Annual Concert
 - the annual competitions
 - the annual dinner with Johnny Handle as the guest speaker
 - the monthly Saturday afternoon sessions at The Chantry in Morpeth
 - the monthly Thursday evening session at The Northumbrian Piper pub
 - the monthly Thursday evening session at the Station East pub
 - the annual Wallington Pipers' Gathering
 - the Annual General Meeting
- Had a presence (often including a "try the pipes" opportunity) at:
 - Rothbury Traditional Music Festival
 - The Glendale Show
 - Ovingham Goose Fair
 - The Northumberland Show
 - Bellingham Show
 - Beamish Pipers' Picnic
- Operated an extremely effective pipe hire service, enabling new pipers to try the instrument before committing to buy a set. There are currently 30 sets of pipes out on hire as I write this report
- · Provided financial support to the Young Pipers' Group run by Richard and Fiona Johnstone
- Provided the structure within which the Pipemakers' Forum can operate, supporting those who are interested in making/fettling pipes
- Provided sets of pipes for use in schools to support those willing to go into schools to teach young people to play
- Published the monthly electronic newsletter
- Operated the "Buddy Scheme" to provide support to new pipers around the world
- · Maintained the Society website
- Managed the Society Archives
- Maintained the Society's office premises at Newbiggin and continued to search for the future physical presence of the Society
- Managed the Society's online shop, offering a wide range of products, including tune books, CDs and pipemaking materials
- Responded to all sorts of general enquiries received through the website and in correspondence
- Managed the finances of running the Society, providing management information and fulfilling annual compliance reporting obligations, and maintaining insurance cover for the Society's assets and activities

CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2025

- Monitored and responded to policy initiatives, including the implementation of the Ivory Act, the adoption of the UNESCO treaty on intangible cultural heritage, the future of the Chantry building (which houses the Bagpipe Museum and many Society events) in Morpeth and liaising with groups including The Bagpipe Society, The Lowland & Border Pipers' Society, The Heritage Crafts Association
- Acted as a point of support and information exchange between Members and regional playing groups, including the Society's Branch in Durham & Cleveland
- Produced a website where people can listen to archive recordings by Forster Charlton and catalogue the contents
- Started to develop a special initiative to support young people to get into piping (see below)
- · Commenced a full review of our policies

I hope you will be impressed.

Of course, "The Society" does nothing. All of this activity is the result of hard work by a relatively small number of dedicated volunteers. I would like to pay tribute here to each and every one of you for making the time to support the aims of the Society in all the different ways you do. Without you, none of the above would happen. Thank you!

One really important development in the last year was the Committee's focus on trying to make sure that the Society continues to be financially sustainable. Like every organisation, we have faced increasing costs. This has required some difficult decisions, not least being the request to Members to approve an increase in subscription fees. Thank you for your support in this at the AGM. Thank you also to all of you who have subsequently agreed to pay your subscription by annual direct debit. This hugely reduces the administrative burden in chasing payments and also makes it easier for overseas members to maintain their membership. Thank you to Norman Douglas (our Treasurer) and Susan Craven (our Administrator) for guiding us through that process.

There is always a worry when you have to increase subscriptions that you lose members as a result. Inevitably, this has been the case. Last year, we had 740 members in total. This year we have a total of 606 of which 441 were paying members (the rest being Life, Honorary, or Junior members, who do not pay subscriptions). Some Members who still pay by standing order have not altered this for many years and are still (despite numerous reminders) paying at an old subscription rate. Rather than cancel their membership, we have created a separate category of "Supporter", so that these former members will continue to receive the monthly Newsletter but will not be full voting members of the Society. The overall result is that subscription income has increased in line with Norman's projections. Nevertheless, I strongly urge you all to encourage any pipers you know who are not members, to join. Even though most of the time spent on Society matters is volunteer time at no financial cost to the Society, the Society can only continue with the financial support of its Members.

The Journal remains an important publication by the Society, capturing information and sharing research in a more lasting format than the Newsletter, and I remain extremely grateful to John Gibbons for his work on this. Unfortunately, due to personal circumstances, it was not possible to publish an edition in 2024. However, it is hoped that it will return in 2025. With postage and printing costs having increased so much, with more people finding the convenience of receiving information electronically and also to help treat all members equally (with no higher subscription for overseas members as was previously needed to cover differential postage costs), the Committee has decided that, in future, the Journal will be circulated to every member in electronic format. A small number of copies will still be printed for archive purposes. Any Member who would still like to receive a hard copy will be able to purchase one at cost price from the Society's online shop, through the website.

The Society's website is becoming ever more important as a shop window, a source of information and many other essential services. The current underlying architecture that makes it all work is getting out of date and needs an overhaul. I am extremely grateful to our new Committee member, Alan Douglass, who understands how these things work. Alan is proving to be a hugely helpful addition to the Committee, leading on the project that will soon see us appoint an external company to carry out the necessary work.

CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2025

Sometimes, the saddest of situations can lead to some really positive outcomes. In the last year, we lost one of our most active pipemakers/reedmakers with the untimely death of Dave Shaw. He is sorely missed by many and it is testament to his influence that The Northumberland Show instigated a new Northumbrian Piping Tent and new set of competitions in his memory and that Beamish Museum held a session in the farmhouse and also established the new Pipers' Picnic to honour his contribution, including bringing the sound of the pipes to this regional attraction. I sincerely hope that both events will now continue, on an annual basis, marking Dave's contribution and bringing the sound of the pipes to many more people. The first Northumbrian Piping Tent and Competitions at The Northumberland Show was a great example of people rallying round to put on a great show at short notice. Ednie Wilson ran her "try the pipes" sessions for anyone wanting to have a go, Andy Lawrenson put on a pipemaking display, Nick Leeming piped at the entrance to the Showfield, there was a session in the tent and Kathryn Tickell judged the competitions. All in all, a great day was had by all. My special thanks to Nicola Davison and Gill Lyons for organising everything.

Looking to the future, there are some initiatives that I believe are really rather exciting.

First is the renewed focus on helping young people to play the pipes. The Society now offers free membership to those still in full time education. This carries with it the free issue of the NPS First Tune Book. We have also started to build a separate stock of pipes for hire to/use by young people, distinct from the current Pipe Hire service we have run for many years. This special stock has recently been significantly increased with the donation to the Society of the pipes formerly owned by The Northumberland Music Service and some private donations. We now have around 20 sets available for this purpose and are working on bringing them all into full playing condition. A number of people have been teaching in schools or privately, and we plan to help these (and others) with some sharing of best practice and possibly by using the Society's charitable status to raise funds to support subsidised tuition/pipe hire. The objective is to remove as many barriers as possible and to open up the option of learning the pipes to as many young people as we can. If you would like to be part of this initiative, please do get in touch with me.

Second is the possible evolution of the great work that Greg McCormick has been doing to digitise and catalogue the Forster Charlton recordings archive. Greg has devised a web-based portal for people to sign up to in order to access the recordings as we try to work out what this archive contains, what copyright issues we may need to deal with and how we can make as much of it as possible more generally available. We still have box loads of tapes to digitise and I am sure that this is going to become an increasingly important archive as the programme expands.

Third, we have been considering what to do with our own archive materials (records, correspondence etc). We are not professional archivists and there is a risk that we do not have the skills or resource properly to look after and preserve what we have, especially if we have to move our offices from the current facility at Newbiggin. The current thinking is to try to digitise as much as possible to go onto our website and to deposit the original materials with either the Northumberland or the Tyne & Wear Archives services, where they would be professionally looked after and still be accessible to members and (in time) to the general public. My thanks to the small team, including Julia Say, Richard Heard and Alex Barrass who have been helping to shape and implement this.

Fourth, those of you who are more observant of these things will have noticed that 2028 will be the Centenary of the Society in its current form. This is surely something definitely worth celebrating. Your Committee has started to pull together a list of possible ways to mark the occasion. If you have any suggestions, please do let us know.

There are, of course, still challenges we need to overcome. One continues to be trying to find the right place to base the Society's "office", where we can store useful materials, shop stock etc, as well as potentially developing it as a base for lessons, sessions or whatever people would like to get together to do. We keep looking for the right place, but no formal solution has been found yet. We currently have less than a year to run on our lease of the premises in Newbiggin, so this is becoming more time critical.

CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2025

As ever, we are always looking for new volunteers. This year, both Julia Say will be retiring from running the Society's online shop and Ann Sessoms will be retiring as our Secretary. As many of you will know, both have been incredible supporters of the Society, having filled many roles over several decades. Both will be hugely missed. We have been fortunate enough to have Louise Woodman volunteer to take over the running of the online bookshop and she is working with Julia on the transition now. We are very keen to find a new person to take on the role of Secretary, if you think you might be able to help, do please get in touch.

Finally, my thanks not only to the people I have mentioned above but also to everyone else who in one way or another contributes to the work of the Society in promoting our wonderful instruments and their music. Do please keep playing out and letting us know through the Newsletter what you have been doing. I am always delighted to see all the groups who gather informally to enjoy playing together. To me, this is the best bit of piping – sharing a good tune with friends. A sincere thank you to all those who have made donations to the Society (either in cash or in the form of sets of pipes or of archive material), to my fellow Committee members for your tireless work and to Baroness Joyce Quin, or President, for your wonderful support.

I look forward to "meeting" as many of you as possible at the AGM.

TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2025

The trustees present their annual report together with the unaudited financial statements of the charity for the ended 31 March 2025. The annual report serves the purposes of both a trustees' report and a directors' report under company law.

The trustees confirm that the annual report and financial statements of the charitable company comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the charitable company's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2019).

Since the charity qualifies as small under section 382 of the Companies Act 2006, the strategic report required of medium and large companies under the Companies Act 2006 (Strategic Report and Directors' Report) Regulations 2013 has been omitted.

Structure, governance and management

a. Constitution

The Northumbrian Pipers' Society (the "Society"), is a charitable company limited by guarantee and is governed by its memorandum and articles of association dated 16 December 2010 as amended by special resolutions dated 3 June 2011, 2 August 2013 and 10 August 2019. The Society was registered with the Charity Commission on 20 June 2011.

The Society includes Cleveland and County Durham Branch which meets at Ceddesfeld Hall, Sedgefield and a number of less formally constituted groups which meet at various locations in Great Britain, mainland Europe, Australia, New Zealand, the United States of America and Canada.

The charitable company was dormant until it acquired the assets and liabilities of the unincorporated Northumbrian Pipers' Society on 1 April 2012.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2025

Structure, governance and management (continued)

b. Members and trustees

The Society has no paid employees and relies on the unpaid voluntary services of members. In early 2017 the Society engaged the services of a part-time self-employed administrator.

The affairs of the Society are managed by a committee elected by members of the Society. Members of the committee are trustees of the charity and directors of the company. Trustees who served during the year are noted on page one.

At the AGM held on 16 Nov 2024 the following Trustees stood down: Tom Fairfax; Paul Knox and Carolyn Soakell.

Baroness Joyce Quin is offering to stand for re-appointment as President of the Society. Andrew John Davison is offering to stand for re-appointment as Chairman. Andrew James Lawrenson, Melanie Jessica Rothman and Vincent Owen Syson are offering themselves for re-election for further two-year terms, expiring at the 2027 AGM.

Formal committee meetings are held physically or by video conference every two months and are supplemented by informal ad hoc meetings and discussions by telephone and email as considered necessary.

The Society endeavours to recruit committee members with a wide variety of musical, technical, professional and organisational skills in order to meet the Society's aims and objectives. Vacancies are advertised to all members through the Newsletter and personal contact networks are also used to identify potential candidates.

Cleveland and County Durham Branch is managed by a committee elected by branch members. Branch committee members are not trustees of the charity or directors of the company and during the year comprised Dave Cook (Chair and Secretary), Peter Manning (Treasurer), Timothy Jones and Philippa Sinclair. Branch accounts for year ending 31 March 2024 were approved at the branch AGM in November 2024 and are included, along with provisional accounts for year ended 31 March 2025, in the accounts of the Society for year ending 31 March 2025.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2025

Objectives and activities

a. Policies and objectives

The objectives of the Society are:

- to advance art, culture and heritage through encouraging the playing, study, making and development of the Northumbrian pipes and their music, and
- to advance the education ofthe public in relation to the study, playing, making and development of the Northumbrian pipes.

In setting objectives and planning for activities, the trustees have given due consideration to general guidance published by the Charity Commission relating to public benefit, including the guidance 'Public benefit: running a charity (PB2)'. They confirm that public benefit has been provided by the range of activities as described in detail in the Chairman's Statement.

Financial review

a. Going concern

After making appropriate enquiries, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason, they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the accounting policies.

b. Reserves policy

The trustees have considered the level of reserves that should be held. Reserves are required to allow for any funding gaps that may arise because of the different timings of income and expenditure throughout the financial year, to cover future expenditure and to allow for contingencies such as emergency expenses or fleeting opportunities to further its charitable aims. The trustees consider that the level of unrestricted reserves not invested in fixed assets should not fall below £10,000. The reserves held at 31 March 2025 were £35,776 (2024: £30,689).

c. Financial review

The financial results for the year are shown in the Statement of Financial Activities ('SOFA'). The charity had a net operating surplus of £9,838 (2024: deficit of £3,722). Net assets at 31 March 2025 totalled £116,225 (2024: £106,387).

Achievements and performance

a. Main achievements of the charity

The achievements and performance of the Society are set out in detail in the Chairman's Statement.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2025

Statement of trustees' responsibilities

The trustees (who are also the directors of the charity for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the trustees' report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under company law, the trustees must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including its income and expenditure, for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles of the Charities SORP (FRS 102);
- make judgments and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards (FRS 102) have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business.

The trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the charity's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Independent examiner's report to the trustees of The Northumbrian Pipers' Society ('the charity')

I report to the charity trustees on my examination of the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2025.

Responsibilities and basis of report

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2025

1. General information

The charity is a company limited by guarantee and has no share capital. The address of the registered office is Time Central, 32 Gallowgate, Newcastle upon Tyne, NE1 4BF. The liability of each member in the event of winding up is limited to £1.

2. Accounting policies

2.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) - Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

The Northumbrian Pipers' Society meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling which is the functional and presentation currency of the charity.

2.2 Going concern

After making appropriate enquiries, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason, they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.

2.3 Income

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

Donations are included in the SOFA when the charity has unconditional entitlement to the resources.

Capital grants received are released over the economic useful life of the asset to which they relate.

Income from other trading activities comprises income from fundraising events and is included when receivable.

Income from investments arises from interest-bearing deposit accounts and is recognised on a receivable basis.

Income from charitable activities includes income from concerts, festivals and pipe hire and is recognised when receivable.

Income from the sale of goods is recognised when substantially all the risks and rewards have been transferred to the buyer.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2025

2. Accounting policies (continued)

2.4 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure on charitable activities is incurred on directly undertaking the activities which further the charity's objectives. Support costs comprise governance costs which are all costs incurred in connection with the administration of the charity and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

All expenditure is inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

2.5 Life memberships

Members of the Society may purchase an individual life membership at any time at a cost of £400. Amounts received in respect of life memberships are released to income over a period of 25 years from 1 April 2012, when the company assumed the assets and liabilities of the former Northumbrian Pipers' Society, or the date the life membership came into existence, whichever is the later.

2.6 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are initially recognised at cost. After recognition, under the cost model, office equipment is measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. All costs incurred to bring a tangible fixed asset into its intended working condition should be included in the measurement of cost.

Depreciation is charged so as to allocate the cost of tangible fixed assets less their residual value over their estimated useful lives, using the straight-line method.

The estimated useful lives are as follows:

Office equipment - 4 years

Tangible fixed assets relating to trophies, medal dies and hire pipes are included in the financial statements under the revaluation model. Pipes held for hire and medal dies are valued by the trustees based on the Society's own expertise.

Trophies are valued by the trustees based on independent professional valuations.

Trophies, medal dies and pipes held for hire are not depreciated, as they do not have finite lives, provided that they are correctly made and properly maintained. The carrying values are assessed each year and an impairment provision is made if necessary. Costs of maintenance are written off in the year in which they are incurred.

2.7 Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost of purchase and net realisable value. Cost comprises actual purchase price and, where applicable, associated direct costs incurred in bringing the stock to its present condition and location. Net realisable value is based on estimated selling price less further costs expected to be incurred to completion and disposal. Provision is made for obsolete, slow-moving or defective items where appropriate.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2025

2. Accounting policies (continued)

2.8 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount.

2.9 Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank consists of Barclays Bank current accounts, Barclays Bank premium accounts and a United Trust Bank deposit account.

2.10 Liabilities

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably.

Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the charity anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide.

2.11 Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

2.12 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes. They comprise donations, concert and festival income and other income receivable.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. Grants and donations obtained for specific purposes are recognised in the financial statements as restricted funds.

During 2012/13, The Sage Gateshead donated a stock of parts for plastic pipes which was initially valued by the trustees at £1,000 and that valuation was included in the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2013 as exceptional voluntary income. These parts needed to be repaired and certain manufacturing faults corrected, and then supplemented and assembled into complete sets of pipes for use principally for hire to schools.

During 2013/14, significant technical challenges were overcome and twenty sets of plastic pipes were completed and made available to Northumberland County Council for use in schools. The trustees have valued the twenty completed sets at £300 each, with the remaining parts being valued at £500 in total. After taking into account expenditure on the project during the year 2013/14, the revaluation surplus was £5,260.

During the year ended 31 March 2014, the trustees obtained an independent professional valuation of trophies which resulted in a revaluation surplus of £14,700.

During the year ended 31 March 2017 the trustees revalued a number of donated sets of pipes which had been refurbished where necessary and brought into use in the hire pool. The revaluation surplus was £3,950.

During the year ended 31 March 2024 the trustees revalued the existing sets of pipes in the hire pool and three sets of pipes that were purchased in the period. The revaluation deficit was £1,350.

During the year ended 31 March 2025 the trustees revalued the existing sets of pipes in the hire pool and three sets of pipes were purchased in he period. The revaluation surplus was £3,350.
